Q&A:

A range of questions were discussed:

- 1. (unknown)What do we mean by the ISOC-ZA vs Internet SA split?
 - a. **ISOC-ZA** is a local civil society organisation in local policy development. Needs to raise funds independently.
 - b. **Internet SA** is a member of ISOC Global and represents them as a Chapter in South Africa. ISA also receives funding from ISOC Global
- 2. (unknown)Is there a founding document (resolution)?
 - a. Yes
 - b. ISOC-ZA
 - c. Internet SA
- 3. Liberty Bwanali: How do young ISP's get help from ISOC? How do they get access to infrastructure and training? Is there a structure available?
 - a. Coenraad responded that we cannot know how to help unless we're asked for specific help.
 - b. ISA is there to do admin and help "keep the vehicle on the road", but they do not "hold the steering wheel". We rely on members to ask for help and take responsibility for their problems and to show the organisation how to help.

- c. Andy also responded: Apply for money! We are a branch of the global Internet Society. Write a proposal and send it to the board, help you get it right for the Internet Society and help you apply.
- d. ISOC-ZA looks at it from a Government Policy perspective and tries to affect government policy. There is a paper written by Ms Mandla Msimang from Pygma Consulting that is a landmark paper: <u>Financing universal access to digital</u> <u>technology and services</u>.
- 4. Do we have a WISP training course that they would like to trail:
 - a. Adri: Send us your course so we can take a look
 - b. Coenraad: We can support any project that
 - c. Andy says that it sounds amazing, and you should write a proposal
- 5. What type of help can Liberty get access to?
 - a. Adri: Send us your proposal so we can see how we can help
- 6. Goals suggestion for next year: Policy reform opportunity with regards to funding
 - Shaun Pather explains: This is with regards to the policy paper that Allen mentioned. Democratizing the internet is important and should be a part of our goals.
 - b. Alan Levin calls this "public policy participation" which would be a function of ISOC-ZA. Yes, it is needed, and people need to get involved in civil society and parliamentary discussions. Alan is happy to support anyone that wants to get involved. If you're looking for funding however, it needs to be discussed with ISA.
- 7. Peter Peele commented that he is concerned about not getting feedback on his proposals.
 - a. Adri clarified that this is an "ISOC Fundamentals Program" related query.
 - b. Adri requested that she and Peter take up the issue the following day (which has been done)
 - c. Side note: Follow up on your proposals. Everyone is a volunteer.
